Theresa Lowe // Mike's Farm

What started as a small family-owned tobacco farm, Mike's Farm has evolved into a multi-faceted agri-business that includes one of the most renowned restaurants in Onslow County. Back in 1986, when Mike and Theresa Lowe took over the reins, they changed gears and started growing Christmas trees and did that successfully for many years. With each successive year since then, the Lowe family has continuously developed the farm, starting with the addition of a full-service bakery, as well as hayrides and their annual Festival of Lights and Ho Ho Christmas Show, followed by the addition of an event venue and wedding barn. Families from all around Eastern North Carolina and beyond come to the farm for the simple pleasure of picking strawberries in the Spring and pumpkins in the Fall.

It was Theresa's vision that convinced her husband to expand to offering a farm-to-table restaurant, complete with fried chicken, pork loin, mashed potatoes, collards, homemade biscuits, and tea, served all you-can-eat, family-style. Keeping platters filled with hot food was a family affair. Aunt Liz was known for her crispy, cast-iron skillet, fried chicken and Aunt Gertrude was known for her delicious biscuits. Both ran the kitchen well into their 80's, and helped make the restaurant the success that it is today. The farm-themed dining room includes a collection of country memorabilia as well as a gift shop, and a front porch with an endless row of rocking chairs that loyal patrons enjoy while waiting to be seated.



In September 2019, Theresa's inspiration resulted in what could eventually become the crowning jewel at Mike's Farm. Having been born and raised in Eastern North Carolina, Theresa wanted to create a place to showcase and sell locally made products. From the Mountains, to the Piedmont, to the Coastal Plains, the NC Products Barn @ Mike's Farm is home to the largest variety of products that are produced, manufactured, and crafted in the great state of North Carolina. Theresa hopes to eventually have all one hundred North Carolina counties represented, and we're sure she will do just that.





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
Evelyn Moore // Yana's Ye Old Drugstore Restaurant

Evelyn Moore, aka "Yana Mama," was inspired to open her restaurant nearly forty years ago to share her love of cooking and the recipes that were passed down to her by her family from her ancestors, who were descendants of an American Indian tribe, named "Yana."

In 1983, she leased the old Bell's Drugstore in downtown Swansboro and filled the dark, wood-paneled walls of the dining room with 1950s memorabilia, a passion of Moore's since going to rock 'n' roll shows at the Charlotte Coliseum as a teen. Moore carried the '50s theme through the menu, mixing family recipes for pancakes, fritters, and coconut pie with classic diner fare.

As the sun rises on Saturday mornings in downtown Swansboro, the line of folks from as close as Raleigh and as far as Argentina, Sweden and France forms outside as the sweet aroma of her famous fruit fritters fills the air.
